cabinetry was installed. Both bathrooms were painted, ceramic floors and new sinks and toilets were installed. The bathroom entrance doors were also made to be handicap accessible.

To transition into returning to in-person worship, outdoor services were held on the church parking lot on Sundays June 6, 2021, and July 4, 2021, with pandemic safety protocols in place. The other Sundays in June and July were held virtually on ZOOM. On Sunday August 1, 2021, our Worship Service was held in the Sanctuary with pandemic safety protocols in place. This was the first time a worship service was held in the sanctuary since in 17 months. Members may either attend the Sunday Worship Service in the Sanctuary or view the service virtually through ZOOM.

Since our beginning in 1890, St. Mark's has been led by 29 Pastors and 7 Assistant Pastors. We were also blessed to have Rev. John Evans and Rev. Louis Conway serve as "Pastors Emeritus" upon their retirements.

We pray God's divine guidance will allow us to continue Proclaiming Christ to the generations, and Equipping Disciples to transform the world.

Introduction to a deeper teaching

5 Every high priest is taken from the people and put in charge of things that relate to God for their sake, in order to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. ² The high priest is able to deal gently with the ignorant and those who are misled since he himself is prone to weakness. ³ Because of his weakness, he must offer sacrifices for his own sins as well as for the people. ⁴ No one takes this honor for themselves but takes it only when they are called by God, just like Aaron.

⁵ In the same way Christ also didn't promote himself to become high priest. Instead, it was the one who said to him,

You are my Son.

Today I have become your Father,

You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek.

⁷ During his days on earth, Christ offered prayers and requests with loud cries and tears as his sacrifices to the one who was able to save him from death. He was heard because of his godly devotion.

⁸ Although he was a Son, he learned obedience from what he suffered.

⁹ After he had been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for everyone who obeys him.

¹⁰ He was appointed by God to be a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

In 1976, the Laurel Charge was dissolved, and Rev. Douglas Logan was appointed the first pastor of St. Mark's as a station church. On Sunday, December 9, 1979, consecration services were held for the remodeled sanctuary and newly built Fellowship Hall.

Rev. George F. DeFord served from 1982–June 1993. In January of 1993, Rev. DeFord became the first full-time pastor of St. Mark's. In July 1993, Rev. Patricia Pride became our first female pastor.

In July 1994, Rev. Robert E. Walker, Jr. was assigned. Unfortunately, it was necessary to return to having a part-time pastor. In 1997, St. Mark's returned to having a full-time pastor with Rev. Vera Mitchell-Mallett.

In July 2001, Rev. John T. Jennings II was appointed. In 2002, St. Mark's began the "Ordained to Build" campaign to construct a new church.

Rev. Robbie Morganfield served from 2008–2014. On October 19, 2008, in honor of the church's 118th Anniversary, the parsonage was remodeled and named **The Level Place Ministry Center**.

From July 2014—June 2019, Rev. Dr. Sonia L. King served. St. Mark's provided opportunities for our members to grow spiritually through new ministries, Winter Shelter for Women who are homeless and Bible Study. Architectural drawings for a church renovation project were also obtained.

In July 2019, St. Mark's welcomed Rev. Eugene Matthews. St. Mark's again returned to having a part-time pastor.

In March 2020, the Covid 19 (Coronavirus) Pandemic shut down the world. After the Men's Day service on March 8, 2020, all churches, schools, and businesses were closed. Because of God's grace, St. Mark's continued to provide worship services for its members. For two Sundays, March 15 and March 22, worship services were held through telephone Conference Calls. Beginning March 29, 2020, our worship service was held virtually through ZOOM; Jaime Coffen served as the ZOOM facilitator. The ZOOM services allowed the St. Mark's family to stay connected. With the leadership of the Trustees, remodeling projects were completed during the pandemic in the fall of 2020. The Sanctuary was painted, and all lights were changed to LED. All church exterior doors were weather stripped. The Fellowship Hall was painted, and LED lights and engineered floors were installed. The Kitchen was painted, and new

St. Mark's United Methodist Church Church History

(Updated October 2021)

In 1890, the spirit of the Lord led Frank Carter and his wife Sarah (Hebron) Carter to organize the home mission known as **St. Mark's Methodist Episcopal Church**, as it was first called. The mission, which consisted of 28 parishioners, was organized under the supervision of Rev. McHenry J. Naylor, a circuit rider preacher who was appointed to the all-black Washington Conference and assigned to the Bladensburg Circuit.

The congregation moved into a hall which was moved directly across the street to where St. Mark's is situated now and remodeled. In 1893, Rev. Steward A. Lewis was appointed the first pastor. St. Mark's and Queen's Chapel became the Laurel Charge, sharing the same minister. In 1895, Bacon's Chapel (now known as Mt. Zion) was added to the Laurel Charge.

The cornerstone was laid for the original edifice on November 8, 1908. In 1912, electric lights were installed. On November 13, 1920, the church which accommodated 50 to 75 people was dedicated.

The congregation outgrew the original edifice, and in 1921 the building was sold and moved across the street. In 1921 the cornerstone was laid for a new sanctuary. The new church, which accommodated up to 150 people, was built at a cost of \$10,480, and was consecrated in the fall of 1923.

In 1939, our church became **St. Mark's Methodist Church**, upon the merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Protestant Church.

Under Rev. Dr. Levi B. Miller's tenure, the offering envelopes were introduced and our first organ was purchased. During Rev. Joseph Haskins' tenure (1953–1959), the Annual Homecoming (4th Sunday in September) became a tradition.

Rev. John Evans was appointed to the Laurel Charge from 1960-1969. In 1968, our church became **St. Mark's United Methodist Church** upon the merger of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren.

Rev. Sarah Andrews Schlieckert

Rev. Sarah Andrews Schlieckert comes from a long family line of clergy in the Baltimore-Washington area. Her brother, father, grandfather, and greatgrandfather all served as clergy. Her husband Chris Schlieckert is director of retreat and camping ministries for the Baltimore-Washington Conference



and is also director of the West River Center. They have two daughters, Anna, 11 and Mary, 8.

She is a graduate of Duke Divinity School with a Master of Divinity and Gettysburg College with a Bachelor of Arts in History and Religion, has served as pastor in several Maryland congregations. As pastor of Pasadena United Methodist Church from July 2020–June 2021 she led the congregation through its ministry during the pandemic, increasing the church's online presence, initiating creative worship elements, and adding new uses of technology beyond worship. She also oversaw a review of endowment policy, helped plan a capital campaign for new windows, and was responsible for the operation of the Pasadena Early Learning Center under COVID restrictions.

From July 2018–June 2020, Rev. Schlieckert was pastor of Calvary United Methodist Church in Waldorf, Maryland. She led the congregation through a transition following the retirement of a pastor after a medium-length tenure, helping to smooth tension around denominational debates and confronting long-simmering issues of decline and financial troubles. She offered multiple short-term study opportunities and used new technologies to reach people. Under her guidance the congregation expanded a partnership with a local non-profit to offer hot meals twice a week at the church and explore new outreach opportunities.

In a 10-month part-time interim position at Melville Chapel United Methodist Church in Elkridge, Maryland, 2017–2018, she led the congregation through an assessment, reflection and visioning following a period of multiple pastoral transitions, including the death of the appointed pastor. She helped establish administrative best practices. As lead pastor of Arden United Methodist Church in

Martinsburg, West Virginia from July 2014—August 2017 she helped the congregation begin its transition from a small church through a ministry program oriented to growth. Under her leadership, the church re-established a children's Sunday School, developed new discipleship opportunities such as Bible studies and a young adult Sunday School class, increased involvement of young families in the church life, and introduced new outreach opportunities to increase congregational involvement in missions.

She is interested in outdoor activities, running, current events, culinary arts, crafts, technology skills, website design, and online social networking.
