Minister Nena Hughes



Minister Nena Hughes is originally from Laurel, Maryland where she along with her husband, Floyd Jr. and their family attend St. Mark's United Methodist Church. Minister Nena is a mother and a grandmother. She grew up here at St. Mark's and have served on various ministries since she was a child. She currently serves as Chair of the Church Council. Minister Nena firmly believes it

makes no difference what may happen or how big a problem, the answer is always in God!

Receiving her call to ministry in 1999, Minister Nena has never stopped working for the Lord. Receiving her license in 2004, through the leadership of the beloved late Pastors William and Bridgette Thomas of Open Bible Ministries in Forestville, Maryland. She has always believed the pulpit is wherever you are—you don't need a microphone to share the Good News, just a willing heart.

Minister Nena loves to worship the Lord and fellowship with others, exchange of praise and worship is priceless! Minister Nena is dedicated and committed to the service of the Lord and has decided to go further in ministry as a candidate for Local Pastor. One of her favorite scriptures is *Isaiah 6:8*, "I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here I am send me."

History of St. Mark's United Methodist Church

In 1890, the spirit of the Lord led Frank Carter and his wife Sarah (Hebron) Carter to organize the home mission known as **St. Mark's Methodist Episcopal Church**, as it was first called. Their home was located at 628 8th Street, then known as Church Street. The mission, which consisted of 28 parishioners, was organized under Rev. McHenry J. Naylor's supervision. Rev. Naylor, a circuit rider preacher, was appointed on trial to the all-black Washington Conference and assigned to the Bladensburg Circuit. From its founding in 1890 until 1965, St. Mark's belonged to an all-Black jurisdiction within the Methodist Church called the Washington Annual Conference.

Shortly after the mission was organized the congregation moved into a hall, given by the Hebron family, located at 599 Church Street. Later on, the congregation had the hall moved directly across the street to where St. Mark's Church is situated now and had it remodeled. In 1893, Rev. Steward A. Lewis was appointed the first pastor of St. Mark's Church. St. Mark's and Queen's Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church became the Laurel Charge, sharing the same minister. In 1895, Bacon's Chapel (now known as Mt. Zion) was added to the Laurel Charge. In 1898 St. Mark's Methodist Episcopal Church filed for incorporation. In 1901 the Laurel Charge acquired a parsonage for the Pastor at 603 8th Street, which was moved in 1960 to 804 West Street.

The cornerstone was laid for the original edifice on November 8, 1908. In 1912, electric lights were installed. On November 13, 1920, the church which accommodated 50 to 75 people was dedicated.

The congregation outgrew the original edifice, and in 1921 the building was sold to the Abraham Lodge and moved across the street. In 1921 the cornerstone was laid for a new sanctuary. The new church, which accommodated up to 150 people, was built at a cost of \$10,480, and was consecrated in the fall of 1923. The ruggedly handsome edifice is constructed of hand-molded cement blocks. Hanging in the belfry is one of three antique bells in Laurel churches. In preparation for the District Conference, which met at St. Mark's, toilets were installed in 1939.

In 1939, our church became **St. Mark's Methodist Church**, upon the merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Protestant Church.

Under Rev. Dr. Levi B. Miller's tenure, the offering envelopes were introduced, and our first organ was purchased. During Rev. Joseph Haskins' tenure (1953-1959), the Annual Homecoming (4th Sunday in September) became a tradition.

Rev. John Evans was appointed to the Laurel Charge from 1960–1969. In 1968, our church became **St. Mark's United Methodist Church** upon the merger of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren.

In 1969, Mt. Zion separated from the Laurel Charge; becoming a station church with its own pastor. In 1976, Rev. Douglas Logan was appointed the first pastor of St. Mark's as a *station church* when the Laurel Charge was dissolved. Under Rev. Logan's leadership, construction plans were made for a renovation and expansion of the church. On Sunday, December 9, 1979, consecration services were held for the remodeled sanctuary and newly built Fellowship Hall.

In June 1982, Rev. George F. DeFord was appointed to St. Mark's as a part-time pastor. In January of 1993, Rev. DeFord became the first full-time pastor of St. Mark's. Rev. DeFord's tenure lasted 11 years. Rev. DeFord organized the acolyte and liturgist ministries and became involved in counseling family members of the incarcerated.

In July 1993, Rev. Patricia Pride became our first female pastor. In July 1994, Rev. Robert E. Walker, Jr. was assigned. Unfortunately, it was necessary to return to having a part-time pastor. In 1997, St. Mark's returned to having a full-time pastor with Rev. Vera Mitchell.

In July 2001, Rev. John T. Jennings II was appointed to St. Mark's. In 2002, St. Mark's began the "Ordained To Build" campaign to construct a new church.

Rev. Robbie Morganfield served from 2008–2014. On October 19, 2008 in honor of the church's 118th Anniversary, the parsonage was remodeled and named **The Level Place Ministry Center**.

Rev. Dr. Sonia L. King was appointed in July 2014. Rev. King served from 2014–2019. To provide opportunities for our members to spiritually grow, the following ministries were initiated or

continued: Winter Shelter for Men and Women who are homeless, Bible Study, Prayer Ministry, Christian Education, Adoption or James Harrison Elementary School, provided space for Bernadette's House, partnership with New Day and the Laurel Police Department, and obtained architectural drawings for church renovation.

In July 2019, St. Mark's welcomed Rev. Eugene Matthews as a part-time pastor. In March 2020, the Covid-19 (Coronavirus) Pandemic shut down the world. For two Sundays, March 15 and March 22, worship services were held through telephone conference calls. Beginning March 29, 2020, our worship service was held virtually through ZOOM; facilitators, Jaime Whitfield-Coffen and Cynthia Whitfield. The pandemic did not stop us from moving forward. Remodeling projects were completed during the pandemic in the fall of 2020. The sanctuary was painted, and all lights were changed to LED. All church exterior doors were weather stripped. The Fellowship Hall was painted, and LED lights and engineered floors were installed. The kitchen was painted, and new cabinetry was installed. Both bathrooms were painted, ceramic floors and new sinks and toilets were installed. The bathroom entrance doors were also made to be handicapped accessible.

Outdoor services were held on the church parking lot on Sundays June 6, 2021, and July 4, 2021, with pandemic safety protocols in place. The other Sundays in June and July were held virtually on ZOOM. After 17 months, on Sunday August 1, 2021, our Worship Service was held in the sanctuary with pandemic safety protocols in place. Members could either attend the Worship Service in the Sanctuary or view the service virtually through ZOOM. Because of a new variant of Covid-19, St. Mark's returned to only virtual ZOOM services from December 26, 2021 until February 27, 2022. On March 6, 2022, Worship Service in the sanctuary resumed; ZOOM was also an option.

In March 2022, Rev. Dr. George F. DeFord, our former Pastor from 1982–1993, became Pastor Emeritus.

On July 1, 2024, Rev. Walter Lee Smith, Jr. was assigned as Pastor.

St. Mark's has been led by 30 Pastors and 7 Assistant Pastors. Upon their retirements, Rev. John Evans, Rev. Louis Conway, and Rev. Dr. George F. DeFord served as "Pastors Emeritus."

- If I'm worried about the costs and <u>insurance coverage</u> for my diagnosis and treatment, who can help me?
